## 2 Peter 3:8-9

What do you think is "His promise" mentioned in vs 9 (hint – beginning of vs 10 should help)?

Why is the Lord longsuffering toward us (looking ahead to vs 15 may help)?

## 2 Peter 3:10-11a

What will certainly come in vs 10?

What happens to the heavens and the earth in vs 10?

How many things will escape being dissolved (vs 11)?

## 2 Peter 3:11b-13 – Now the practical stuff!

The coming reality of all things being dissolved can do what to us (vs 11b)?

Since all these things will happen, what should we be looking for (vs 12)?

Verse 13 tells us the basis for our looking – it is according to what?

Where do we find this (the answer to the previous question)? Connect your answer to vs 5, vs 6, and vs 7.

What is so thrilling about the new heavens and earth (vs 13b)?

From vs 13-14, should we be looking for the end with dread and fear? How should we be looking?

Because we are "looking forward to these things" what two imperatives are given (vs 14-15)?

Since "we know this beforehand" two more imperatives are given (vs 17-18):
