Prefatory Letter to Francis I (Read pgs. xvii-28)

"... We have nothing of which we can boast before God except His mercy alone, by which through no merit of our own, we are saved (2 Cor. 10:17-18; Titus 3:5). Nor can we boast of anything before men except our weakness, which all men regard as a mark of deep disgrace (2 Cor. 11:30; 12:5, 9)."
