

What does all the glory mean?

Luke 9:27-36
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I. The glory of Jesus in His Person

A. This time of this glory

- 1. After eight days**
- 2. While Jesus prayed**

B. This nature of this glory: It was a “visible” display of His glory

C. The witness to His glory:

- 1. Moses and Elijah came as representatives of the offices they held in the Old Testament**
- 2. Peter, James, and John were chosen to be witnesses of this glory**
- 3. God the Father came to bear witness:**
 - a. To give another “visible” manifestation of glory.**
 - b. To give an “audible” witness to the glory of Jesus.**

II. The Glory of Jesus in His Work

A. Discovered in the conversation Moses and Elijah have with Him

B. Discovered by what Peter says to Him.

C. Discovered by what God the Father says about Him.

III. The glory of Jesus for His people

A. The proof: This is seen in the all encompassing glory at the Transfiguration.

B. The purpose:

- 1. To encourage the disciples in their ministries.**
- 2. To encourage believers in their lives. This is a powerful means of motivation.**
- 3. To establish a further witness to the glory of Christ. We are called to reflect that glory to a watching world in word and deed.**
- 4. To exhort us to hope in future glorification.**

- 1) Have you seen the glory of Jesus Christ? Have you asked God to show you His glory?
- 2) After you have prayed to see His glory, do you search the Scriptures?
- 3) Do you know of specific sins in your life that are keeping you from seeing His glory?
- 4) Who are some people in your life that can tell about this glory?
