

Scripture Reading

MICAH

- 1. Chapters 1–2. After God judges the nation for disobedience, he will personally save, shepherd, and lead a remnant.
- 2. Chapters 3–5. After God judges the leaders for their disobedience, he will raise up a Shepherd-King from Bethlehem who will bless the world with peace.
- 3. Chapters 6–7. After God judges his people for their failure, he will lead in a monumental comeback for the remnant he forgives.

THE MAIN POINT OF MICAH

God's just judgment will fall on the rebel world, but he will save a remnant and bless all nations through his Bethlehem-born King—all because he delights in covenant-keeping love.

"Nowhere else in the Bible is God described as rich in anything. The only thing he is called *rich* in is: mercy [Ephesians 2:4]. What does this mean? It means that God is something other than we naturally believe him to be. It means that the Christian life is a lifelong shedding of tepid thoughts of the goodness of God. Global Peace

Micah 4:3-4

- 1. Around 500 bc Israel returned from Babylon to Jerusalem with foreign support to rebuild the temple, city, and people.
- 2. Around 5 bc The Shepherd-King was born in Bethlehem. He healed the lame and preached repentance. Many inside and outside Israel turned from their idolatry and experienced peace with God.
- 3. To the present The church is advancing the gospel of Jesus among the nations, and all who embrace it are forgiven and experience more peace than in any other global community.
- 4. In the future After Babylon's fall, the redeemed from every nation will be experience no more sin and death—and peace forever.

- 1. No matter how tumultuous your present situation, Jesus, the world's Shepherd-King who was born in Bethlehem is our peace (Micah 5:2–5).
- 2. No matter how deep the darkness in which you're sitting, hope in the God who delights in steadfast love and mercy (Micah 7:8–20).
