## Introduction:

- 1. WHY DID PAUL ADDRESS STUMBLINGBLOCKS AND CONSCIENCE IN THIS PORTION OF ROMANS?
  - a. Consider first a very brief outline of Romans.
  - b. Consider secondly a brief survey of chapters 12 and 13.
    - (1) Christ's people are to be living sacrifices (12:1-2). Paul says
    - (2) Christ's people should live in unity, using their gifts to edify the body (12:3-8).
    - (3) Christ's people are to love sincerely (12:9-21).
    - (4) Christ's people are to be submissive to the powers that be (13:1-7).
    - (5) Christ's people are to serve Him communities of love (13:8-10).
    - (6) Christ's people are to be alert and to live in holiness (13:11-13).
    - (7) Christ's people are to make no provision for their lusts (13:14).
- 2. Consider the things over which we disagree.
  - a. Primary doctrine
  - b. Secondary doctrine
  - c. Indifferent doctrine

- 3. What are the main lessons we may draw from chapter 14 regarding our consciences?
  - (1) Congregations are usually made up of strong and weak consciences (14:1-2).
  - (2) God receives His children whether strong or weak of conscience (14:3-4).
  - (3) All believers should be fully persuaded in what they believe (14:5).
  - (4) Jesus is the Lord of His people and their consciences (14:5-9).
  - (5) All believers will give account of their lives in the Day of Judgment (14:10-13a).
  - (6) All believers are to avoid putting stumbling blocks before other believers (14:13b)
  - (7) Our liberty can destroy other believers (14:14-17).
  - (8) All believers should follow after peace with other believers (14:18-20).
  - (9) All believers should deny themselves for the well-being of others (14:21).
  - (10) All believers embrace or reject what they do by faith (14:22-23).
