I. Introduction

- B. Human can learn from animals (Job 12:7-9)
- C. Read Jonah 1:1-3 and chart the course for the sermon

II. Jonah ran (Jonah 1:1-3)

- A. Jonah is called (Jonah 1:1)
 - 1. The historical context of his calling (2 Kings 14:23-27)
 - a. the condition of the kingdom of Israel (prosperous)
 - b. the condition of the kingdom of Assyria (turmoil)
 - 2. Understanding Jonah's calling (Jonah 1:2)
 - a. go up
 - b. to Nineveh the great city
 - c. and cry out against it
 - d. for their wickedness has come up before me

ra'ah ... is this evil or calamity?

is there a link between the two?

what about a man born blind (John 9) or

a tower falling and killing 18 people (Luke 13)

- e. God's compassion desired their repentance as well as to alleviate their pain (Psalm 145:9)
- 3. Jonah's flight from the call (Jonah 1:3)
 - a. his disobedience was intentionally opposite to God's calling
 - b. his flight was characteristic of a dove (yonah) Psalm 55:4-8
- B. Why did God ordain a prodigal?
- C. Is it really possible for anyone to *flee from the presence of the Lord?*
 - 1. was Jonah affected by pagan ideas of local gods?
 - 2. another idea as to what "presence of the Lord" means
 - 3. God's omnipresence

(Amos 9:2-4, Psalm 139, Rom 8:37-39, Jer 23:23-24)

- a. is the doctrine of God's omnipresence a comfort to you?
- b. many try to hide from God, fearing His presence (Isaiah 2:10,19, Hosea 10:8, Rev 6:15-17)

c. realize that you cannot run from God – (Heb 4:13)

repent and hide yourself in Christ alone!

III. We run

- A. Like Jonah we seek to flee the presence of the Lord
 - 1. Its been our propensity to do so since the fall of Adam
- B. Like Jonah we have been clearly called
 - 1. Are you serving Christ or running away?

IV. Christ didn't run

- A. Like Jonah, Christ ...
- B. Unlike Jonah, Christ ...
- C. Christ answers the question that Jonah left unanswered (Jon 4:11)
