PECA Sermon Outline on Matthew 5:3, February 7, 2016

Intro:

1 Samuel 2:6-8.

<u>Main Point of Text:</u> King Jesus says it is good to reject yourself as no earthly good so you can receive His heavenly goodness.

Sermon Point: Happy is He Who Cries, "Woe is Me!"

Move 1: How happy are you who have Christ and His Kingdom.

"for theirs is the kingdom of heaven": the reward of the poor in spirit. What you received. The great exchange: your poverty for Christ's riches. You have a wonderful future kingdom of glory; and a promising present kingdom of grace (WSC 102): "is". You now possess: "theirs". You have heard Christ, so He has laid His healing hand upon your weary soul: The Spirit of the Lord GOD is upon me; because the LORD hath anointed me ... he hath sent me to bind up the brokenhearted ... (Isa. 61:1; Lk. 4:16-21). Phil. 4:13; Heb. 12:28; Rev. 2:8-9, 10; 3:21; 21:7; 22:5; 2 Pet. 1:10-11; ... walk worthy of God, who hath called you unto his kingdom and glory. (1 Thess. 2:11-12).

Move 2: How happy are you who know you need to have Christ and His Kingdom.

"Blessed are the <u>poor in spirit</u>": the receivers of the reward. *How* you received. Christ forgives the debts of those who declare personal bankruptcy. All are morally destitute, but few accept/acknowledge it. The poor in spirit are like Paul in Phil. 3:7-9. Such have a true view of themselves in view of God, like Ps. 73:21-22. They say Gen. 32:10; Lk. 15:17, 21; Mt. 3:11; Lk. 18:13. If you are poor in spirit, you are not proud of heart. You boast of no self-assertion, reliance, or confidence, like the spirit of another church in Rev. (3:14-18; Isa. 55:1ff). Lk. 14:26: *If any man come to me, and hate not ... his own life ... he cannot be my disciple*. The humble preacher approaches the pulpit with 2 Cor. 2:16. You response to the preaching humbly reflects 2 Cor. 10:5.
