I. Introduction and review.

- A. Are you superstitious?
- B. Samuel is absent from the ark narrative. Why? I Sam. 4-6

II. Israel loses two battles and the ark of the covenant. 4:1-12

- A. Israel is soundly defeated by the Philistines. 4:1-2
 - 1. Who are the Philistines? 13:19ff Judges 14
 - 2. Apparently the Philistines wanted to expand their territory.
- B. Israel's leaders plan to harness God's power by bringing the ark of the covenant into the next battle. 4:3-5
 - 1. They ask the right question: Why has the LORD defeated us today? 4:3a
 - 2. Why were they defeated and what should they have done? 7:3-4 Judges 3:9,15 Dt. 28:15,25 Lev. 26:15ff Num. 10:35
 - 3. They should have sought counsel from the LORD's prophet Samuel. 3:19-4:1a
 - 4. Instead they try to manipulate God's power by using the ark of the covenant of the LORD as a good luck charm. 4:3b-4
 - 5. What is the ark of the covenant? Ex. 25:10-22 37:1ff Heb. 9:4-5 Lev. 16
 - 6. Why would they think that the ark would deliver them in battle? Joshua 3,6
 - 7. Why didn't it work?
- C. Both the Israelites and the Philistines are impressed. v. 5-9
 - 1. The Israelites shout with confidence. v. 5
 - 2. The Philistines are terrified. v. 6-9
- D. The Philistines again defeat Israel, this time capturing the ark. v. 10-11 Ps. 78:56-
 - 1. The slaughter of Israelites is much worse than before. v. 10 Deut. 28:25 Isa. 13:8
 - 2. The ark of God is captured.
 - 3. The prophecy is fulfilled as Hophni and Phinehas both die. 2:34 3:12
 - 4. God always keeps His Word. 3:19
 - 5. God judges sin.
- E. Application: Don't be superstitious.
 - 1. What is wrong with superstition? Deut. 18:9-14
 - 2. How do people try to manipulate God's power today?
 - 3. Your external religious acts will not gain God's favor.
 - 4. God is free and sovereign. Don't put Him to the test. Acts 19:14-16

III. The glory has departed. 4:12-22

- A. This is one of the worst defeats in Israel's history, only matched by the defeat and exile by Babylon in 587 BC.
- B. Eli, upon hearing the bad news, dies. 4:12-18
 - 1. This resembles later scenes in which messengers arrive with news from a battle. II Sam. 1:2ff 18:24ff
 - 2. What was Eli's chief concern? v. 13b,18 2:29-30
 - 3. This marks the end of the prominence of Eli's house.

- C. Eli's daughter-in-law dies as her child, Ichabod (no glory), is born. 4:19-22 Mt. 24:19
 - 1. Like Rachel, she names her son with her dying breath. Gen. 35:16-19
 - 2. Ichabod's name reflects the darkness of the hour. Ps. 78:56-64
 - 3. The reality is that the glory of God had departed a long time ago.
 - 4. The glory never returns to Shiloh. Jer. 7:12,14 26:6,9
 - 5. This chapter is a miniature of Israel's history, providing a foretaste of the day when they will be driven from the land as the glory departs. Ezek. 10 Mt. 21:33ff
 - 6. The glory of God will return to His chosen people.
 - 7. God can take care of His stuff.
- D. Application: Can the glory of the LORD depart from us?
 - 1. God is not tied to any particular nation in this age. John 18:36 I Pe. 2:9
 - 2. Formerly faithful churches may have their lampstands removed. Rev. 2:5
 - a. In this age God's glory is tied to His church. I Pe. 2:9-10 Eph. 3:21 5:27
 - b. "Ichabod" could be inscribed over many churches. 2:29-30
 - 3. Do we sometimes experience hardship because of our sins? Prov. 3:11-12 Heb. 12:1ff Ps. 139:23-24
 - 4. Though it may seem that God has been defeated at a given time, He is working out His glorious plan.

- B. Where is God's glory and power manifested today?
 - 1. Is the ark of the covenant still important today?
 - 2. The glory of the LORD has appeared in Christ. John 1:14 17:24
 - 3. Jesus has entered the holiest place in heaven and made redemption for our sins once and for all. Heb. 9
 - 4. When it seemed that God was defeated at the cross, Jesus was raised from the dead. Death could not hold him. Acts 2:24ff
 - 5. Jesus has conquered our enemies. Col. 2:15ff Luke 10:18
 - 6. His power is manifest in us through the gospel. <u>I Cor. 1:18ff</u> Rom. 1:16-17 <u>Heb. 4:12</u> Eph. 1:18ff
 - 7. He is glorified in His church. Eph. 3:21 5:27
