Let me briefly remind you of why Paul is referring to Predestination with the intended goal to make us like Christ. Remember He said

¹⁷ and <u>if children, then heirs</u>—heirs of God and joint heirs with Christ, <u>if indeed we suffer with *Him*, that we may also be glorified together.</u>

4416 prōtótokos (from 4413 /prótos, "first, pre-eminent" and 5088 /tíktō, "bring forth") – properly, first in time (Mt 1:25; Lk 2:7); hence, pre-eminent (Col 1:15; Rev 1:5).

4416 /prōtótokos ("firstly") specifically refers to Christ as the first to experience glorification, i.e. at His resurrection (see Heb 12:23; Rev 1:5). For this (and countless other reasons) Jesus is "preeminent" (4416 /prōtótokos) – the unequivocal Sovereign over all creation (Col 1:16).

[4416 (prōtótokos) refers to "the first among others (who follow)" – as with the preeminent, glorified Christ, the eternal Logos who possesses self-existent life (Jn 5:26).]

In Jewish culture the term **first-born** always referred to a son, unless a daughter was specifically stated.

Because the **first-born** male child in a Jewish family had a privileged status, the term was often used figuratively to represent preeminence. In the present context that is clearly the meaning.

This preeminence is seen in Philippians 2:9–11 (NKJV)

⁹ Therefore God also has highly exalted Him and given Him the name which is above every name, ¹⁰ that at the name of Jesus every knee should bow, of those in heaven, and of those on earth, and of those under the earth, ¹¹ and *that* every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ *is* Lord, to the glory of God the Father.

This is beautiful...we deserved nothing but hell, and yet Christ does not just save us, he does not

just make us his servants but he brings us into the family through adoption and makes us brothers.

God's desire of us is not just to save us for his glory and to have us be the eternal displays of trophies of grace, But He desires intimacy with us.

The Eternal One desires to have genuine, real, intimate fellowhip with his creation.

The firstborn is, of course, the most important of the children. He is the heir and the one singled out for special honor. But firstborn implies "later born"; the term points to others who will in due course be members of the family. Paul is saying that it was always in God's plan that there might be many in his family, children who look to Christ as the firstborn and rejoice that they are children of the same Father (cf. v. 17).

We are accordingly to live as members of the family, and that means being made like our elder Brother. This is all part of God's predestination; he predestined us not only to be released from an unpleasant predicament, but in order that we might become like his Son."

Lesson

Lets now turn our attention to the Golden Chain.

This is one of the most profound and reassuring statements in all of the Bible on the security and the Guarantee of Salvation.

This is the great declaration of the purpose of God as stated in Romans 8:28

²⁸ And we know that all things work together for good to those who love God, to those who are the called according to *His* purpose.

God is Sovereignly and Providentially working everything for the good, because we have been saved according to His great purpose....

What is that Great purpose.

He also predestined *to be* conformed to the image of His Son, that He might be the firstborn among many brethren

We get a small glimpse of the magnitude of this in Revelation

Revelation 7:9–10 (NKJV)

⁹ After these things I looked, and behold, a great multitude which no one could number, of all nations, tribes, peoples, and tongues, standing before the throne and before the Lamb, clothed with white

robes, with palm branches in their hands, ¹⁰ and crying out with a loud voice, saying, "Salvation belongs to our God who sits on the throne, and to the Lamb!"

This will occur because it is brought about by will of God.

It is intentional, it is planned, it is predetermined. It is a willful act on God's part through is grace to save many and make them brethren from the fallen race of Adam.

This is not left to the will of man. It is not left to the programs of the church. It is not left to the clever devises of man to accomplish.

This plan and the fulfillment of it is left to the predetermined purpose of God. This is fulfilled but the series of 5 connected actions on God's apart.

All of this depends on God, not man. Man has no part in this at all.

Paul never mentions, once in this text the word, believe, or faith, receive, or repent or confess.

Although those are essential for someone to be saved, They are not the cause of salvation.

God is the cause fo salvation, The belief, repentance and confession of the sinner is a result

of the Cause of Salvation. It is the fruit of the purpose of God.

This Great assurance of Salvation of this is gaurneteed by the Great work of God in securing us with the Golden Chain of Salvation. There are 5 links in the chain.

They are unbreakable links that are dependent on the previous link

One is just as strong as the next, and there is not a weak link in the entire chain.. All rest and find their strength in the Omnipotence of God.

First Link in Golden Chain Foreknowledge.

This is where it all begins,

We have looked at this word already in verse 29.

29 For whom He foreknew, He also predestined to be conformed to the image of His Son,

As we noted

This is not talking about foresight.

We are not saying that God does not have foresight, because He does, but we have pointed out that He has foresight because He fore ordains.

He knows the future because he determines the future and has the power to carry it out. But even with that understanding, it would have to be admitted that God would know all the possibilities of the future because He is omniscience and all wise.

But this universe is not left to possibility or chance. It is following a plan devised by a perfect God to accomplish a perfect plan to bring perfect Glory to himself.

Foreknowledge includes 3 things Biblically

1. A Predetermined Relationship

to Fore know in the sense, to determine to know someone intimately, to fore love.

Romans 11:2 (NKJV)

² God has not cast away His people whom He foreknew....

Amos 3:2 (NKJV)

2 "You only have I known of all the families of the earth;

Genesis 4:1 (NKJV)

4 Now Adam knew Eve his wife, and she conceived and bore Cain,...

2. A Predetermined Destiny.

To set your love on someone, determines there relationship with God, and hence there destiny to be with Him.

Acts 2:23 (NKJV)

²³ Him, being delivered by the determined purpose and foreknowledge of God, you have taken by lawless hands, have crucified, and put to death; determined = horizon— the word in predestination purpose = boule Foreknowlege= foreordination.

Some have said, this is an example of a Greek rule known as the Granville Sharp rule.

By the determinate counsel and foreknowledge of God (τη ὑρισμενη βουλη και προγνωση του θεου [tēi hōrismenēi boulēi kai prognōsēi tou theou]). Instrumental case. Note both purpose (βουλη [boulē]) and foreknowledge (προγνωσις [prognōsis]) of God and "determined" (ὑρισμενη [hōrismenē], perfect passive participle, state of completion). God had willed the death of Jesus (John 3:16) and the death of Judas (Acts 1:16), but that fact did not absolve Judas from his responsibility and guilt (Luke 22:22). He acted as a free moral agent

Proginoskein and prognōsis in the New Testament ... do not denote simple intellectual foresight or prescience, the mere taking knowledge of something beforehand, but rather a selective knowledge which regards one with favor and makes one an object of love, and thus approaches the idea of foreordination, Acts 2:23 (comp. 4:28); Rom. 8:29; 11:2; 1 Peter 1:2. These passages simply lose their meaning, if the words be taken in the sense of simply taking knowledge of one in advance, for God foreknows all men in that sense. 3. A predetermined People.

The Elect.

To predetermine to set your love on a person, assumes that you have made a choice of a particular person to love. i.e. To elect or to choose someone.

Elect is a term that refers to the people of God

Romans 8:33 (NKJV)

³³ Who shall bring a charge against God's elect? *It is* God who justifies.

2 Thessalonians 2:13 (NKJV)

This election is based on Forknowledge.

God chose you base on His foreknowledge of you. He chose depended on his predetermining to to have a relationship, to fore love you.

So really, it can be said

His predetermining to set his love on you is what elected you

He are elect because God has chosen to love you. You can see how this has a foreordination in it.

When God made decision to love you, it set the plan in motion.

So this is the beginning of it all. God determines to love your, He thereby is electing you, selecting your, and as a result you are predestined to in the purposes of God for Salvation.

- 2. This is not based on partiality
- 3. It is sovereign, it is bound up in the purpose of God

The Predestination of God is not probable, or possible...it is actual. This is a real determined plan that includes real sinners made righteous by the grace of God in the blood of Christ.

There is two types of callings in the NT.

1. General Call —- to everyone, without exception this is outward, extended to all. It is the open gospel command for all to come and and believe in Christ for Salvation.

It is not necessary effectual. It is not necessarily successful.

2. The Effectual Call— it is to the elect and is with distinction.

This is inward, and only for the elect of God. It is the work of the Holy Spirit in drawing the sinner to the Father through Christ. It include regeneration, illumination, faith and repentance and confession of sin.

It is the resurrection of the one dead in his sins and the enablement of the sinner to come to Christ

IT is Limited in scope

It is successful in saving the sinner.

It is effectual.

We know that this calling in v. 30 is effectual and limited because it leads to justification

²³ Not only *that*, but we also who have the firstfruits of the Spirit, even we ourselves groan within ourselves, eagerly waiting for the adoption, the redemption of our body.

2 Corinthians 4:17 (NKJV)

¹⁷ For our light affliction, which is but for a moment, is working for us a far more exceeding *and* eternal weight of glory,

Colossians 3:4 (NKJV)

⁴ When Christ *who is* our life appears, then you also will appear with Him in glory.

2 Thessalonians 2:13-14 (NKJV)

¹³ But we are bound to give thanks to God always for you, brethren beloved by the Lord, because God from the beginning chose you for salvation through sanctification by the Spirit and belief in the truth, ¹⁴ to which He called you by our gospel, for the obtaining of the glory of our Lord Jesus Christ.
