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## INTRODUCTION

- James as an early "bridge" letter of early Christian teaching between the life of Jesus and latter letters
- •The markedly undeveloped doctrine of Jesus Christ (named 2x) and Holy Spirit
  - •Yet, most explicitly influenced by the teachings of Jesus (as recorded later in the Gospels)
  - •A Jewish (OT and 2nd Temple) and Jesus theology as backdrop, but main characters are the outworking of a practical faith in the world
- •Example of early and basic teachings through a combination of education, time, and personality

## INTRODUCTION

- •Topical, illustrative, practical, and pastoral with an emphasis on obedience
- $\bullet \mbox{Higher percentage of imperatives than any other NT letter}$
- •Luther's "epistle of straw" comment (despite use)
  - •Emphasis on justification by faith alone conflict between James and Paul
  - Warning of the danger of theological presuppositions skewing perspective
- "General" (or universal) letter, not occasional to a particular church, but to a wider group of churches, yet under similar circumstances

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JOY IN LIFE'S TRIALS (2-4)	
Count it all <i>joy</i> , my siblings,	
when you meet trials/temptations of various kinds,	
for you know that the <i>testing</i> of your faith (trusting reliance)	
produces steadfastness.	
And let steadfastness have its full effect, that you may be perfect and complete, lacking in nothing.	
that you may be perject and complete, lacking in nothing.	
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WISDOM IN LIFE'S TRIALS (5-8)	
If any of you lacks wisdom, let him ask God,	
who gives generously to all without reproach,	
and it will be given him.	
But let him ask in faith (trusting reliance), with no doubting, for the one who doubts is like a wave of the sea	
that is driven and tossed by the wind.	
For that person must not suppose	
that he will receive anything from the Lord;	
he is a double-minded man, unstable in all his ways.	

A CASE STUDY IN WISDOM (9-11)	
Let the lowly brother boast in his exaltation, and the rich in his humiliation, because like a flower of the grass he will pass away.  For the sun rises with its scorching heat and withers the grass; its flower falls, and its beauty perishes.  So also will the rich man fade away in the midst of his pursuits.	
RESPONSE	
•Trial/temptations are not to be rejoiced in themselves, but the <b>potential</b> they have, in response to a faithful and sovereign Lord, to produce in us <b>maturity and wholeness</b>	
•Trusting reliance in God and His wisdom, gained by persevering prayer, is the necessary factor in the alchemic transformation of the iron of difficulty to the gold of Christ-likeness (IOW, it isn't automatic)	
•The <b>application</b> of that wisdom to trial/temptations, whether our condition is "high" or "low" is the key to growing in the
