Mothers of the Church (1 Tim 5:3–16; Titus 2:3–5) GCC, 9/29/19, Morning Service

<u>Introduction:</u> Is there something *less* than ordained service but *more* than general service for women in the church?

- I. The Order of Servant Widows (1 Tim. 5:3-16)
  - A. Widows who are to be cared for by the church (vv. 3–8)
    - 1. Inclusio of monetary care (vv. 8 and 16)
    - 2. Who is a "true widow" for whom the church is to care? (vv. 4–8)
      - a. V. 4-Widows with family are to be cared for by the family
      - b. V. 5-A True Widow
      - c. V. 6—An Illegitimate Widow
  - B. The order of Servant Widows (vv. 9–10)

Three reasons for a list of widows who serve the church:

- 1. Why would Paul give Timothy a set of requirements regarding which widows were to receive aid after he had just done so in verses 4 through 8?
  - a. The qualifications in vv. 9–10 are primarily about a proven track record of service to family and church
- 2. If vv. 9–10 is referring to women who can receive provision from the church, then that means that a legitimate widow with legitimate needs (according to v. 5) would be forbidden from receiving support from the church if she were under 60 years of age.
- 3. The vow of celibacy (implied from vv. 11-12).
  - a. A vow of celibacy is required for the order of widows
  - b. Younger widows should not take this vow but should remarry
  - c. If those on the list were receiving charity, we would expect Paul to encourage remarriage as soon as possible to relieve the financial burden of the church. A vow of celibacy makes no sense whatsoever if the list consisted of widows who were to receive church funds.
- II. Church History Corroborates the Order of Servant Widows
  - 1. Church history refers to "deaconesses." Not ordained. But almost every time they are mentioned, the councils cite qualifications which come from 1 Tim 5
  - 2. "Deaconesses" prepared female baptismal candidates and sometimes baptized them
  - 3. "Deaconesses" instructed female converts on how to stay holy and uphold their baptism.
  - 4. Deaconesses visited women in the church to avoid the appearance of evil.

## III. Conclusions

1. There are only two ordained offices in the church, elder and deacon, and they are limited to men.

- 2. The Order of Servant Widows was an auxiliary help to the women and the poor in the church.
- 3. It is very likely that Paul had this "order of widows" in mind by including qualifications for women in 1 Tim 3:11
- 4. It is very likely that Phoebe was of the order of widows in Rom 16:1, 2
- IV. Why We Need Mothers (Widows and Older Women) of the Church (Titus 2:3–5)
  - A. To Serve Wives and Mothers
  - B. To Teach Single Women (Young and Old) to be Self-Controlled and Pure
  - C. To Not Simply Give "Moral Instruction," but the Gospel
