Call to Worship

* Reading from the Law

As we shall see in today's sermon, the meaning of the Sabbath is tied to God's freeing us from the bondage to which we have been subjected in sin. We are therefore commanded to "rest," which is to avail ourselves of the provision of relief from the curse God placed upon our labor, an action which depends upon and expresses our trust in His provision.

Deuteronomy 5:12-15 ESV

"'Observe the Sabbath day, to keep it holy, as the LORD your God commanded you. ¹³ Six days you shall labor and do all your work, ¹⁴ but the seventh day is a Sabbath to the LORD your God. On it you shall not do any work, you or your son or your daughter or your male servant or your female servant, or your ox or your donkey or any of your livestock, or the sojourner who is within your gates, that your male servant and your female servant may rest as well as you. ¹⁵ You shall remember that you were a slave in the land of Egypt, and the LORD your God brought you out from there with a mighty hand and an outstretched arm. Therefore the LORD your God commanded you to keep the Sabbath day.

Silent Confession of Sin

Corporate Confession of Sin

Victory over our enemies, especially our spiritual ones (the world, the flesh, and the Devil), involves overcoming the weight of our guilt and its oppressive affect on the thoughts of our hearts. We thus appeal to God with the psalmist for rest from the guilt and anxiety of our sins, which only He can provide.

Assurance of Pardoning Grace

Our rest as Christians centers on the work of our High Priest on our behalf, which frees us from the toilsome burden of trying to have life apart from His completely adequate and accomplished work, by which we have unhindered access to God.

Hebrews 4:9-16 ESV

So then, there remains a Sabbath rest for the people of God, ¹⁰ for whoever has entered God's rest has also rested from his works as God did from his.

11 Let us therefore strive to enter that rest, so that no one may fall by the same sort of disobedience. ¹² For the word of God is living and active, sharper than any two-edged sword, piercing to the division of soul and of spirit, of joints and of marrow, and discerning the thoughts and intentions of the heart. ¹³ And no creature is hidden from his sight, but all are naked and exposed to the eyes of him to whom we must give account.

¹⁴ Since then we have a great high priest who has passed through the heavens, Jesus, the Son of God, let us hold fast our confession. ¹⁵ For we do not have a high priest who is unable to sympathize with our weaknesses, but one who in every respect has been tempted as we are, yet without sin. ¹⁶ Let us then with confidence draw near to the throne of grace, that we may receive mercy and find grace to help in time of need.

The Apostles' Creed

Distribution of Elements

Because we believe that wine was used in the Last Supper and is thus more in accord with the fullness of symbolism intended by God in the Lord's Supper, we offer and encourage wine for those who take part in Communion. For those with conscientious convictions against the use of wine, however, we offer grape juice, which is contained in the inner circle of the communion trays. The cups containing wine are in the outer circles.
